B. Items of Business:

1. Darry Stacy moved, seconded by Harold Haralson, to approve the Resolution as corrected authorizing the issuance of a special election proclamation and calling for a *countywide election on November 12, 2019, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of Cleveland County, for their approval or rejection, the question of enacting a one-eighth of one percent sales tax (with no County sales tax increase) on gross receipts or proceeds of certain taxable sales within Cleveland County for the purpose of providing funds for public safety facilities, emergency services, salaries, and additional programming, operations and maintenance expenses of the Cleveland County Justice Facility and programs and renovation or new construction for the County Juvenile Detention Facility. (Clerk's Note: *Countrywide was amended to countywide.)

John Shabel, Cedar Country Fire Protection District, from the southeast portion of Cleveland County, said he is here to talk about the possibility of public safety tax. In his district they serve roughly 6,500 people and approximately 68 square miles. They are 100% volunteer and through the ad valorem tax funding they receive the Fire Department is maintained and kept to a certain standard. They have a lot of maintenance cost and vehicle maintenance cost that makes it hard to bring equipment up to date. He asked for continued support in moving forward.

Sheriff Todd Gibson said that citizens will benefit from high-quality responsive services and is in support of the resolution.

Commissioner Stacy said that this is an incredible opportunity for the citizens to invest back into their community and will really make a difference on so many levels. This will provide the opportunity for actual criminal justice reform at a local level. It's talked about a lot at the state and national level, but they never truly reach down to the local level and do criminal justice reform. He is excited about the portion of this being about the Juvenile Detention Center. They want to try to get these juveniles before they become occupants of the jail and added that the time spent in rehabilitating juveniles is an advantage to everyone.

Chairman Harold Haralson said, "This proposal demonstrates our commitment to public safety. In the last ten years, we have demonstrated what can be accomplished when we work together as a community. We've built the jail, on time, under budget and paid it off nearly a decade early. Now we have the opportunity to continue that commitment by ensuring that our fire departments all across the county have the resources they need. Half a million dollars a year will go long way in making sure that our departments have grant opportunities for the proper bunker gear, and other equipment to keep them

safe while working in often hazardous conditions. We are also working to improve overall healthcare access by ensuring that emergency response times are reduced by investing \$100,000.00 for EMS grants. Commissioner Stacy mentioned our proposed investments in juvenile justice, surly there is no greater resource in our county than our children, working to ensure those who have fallen onto a dangerous path can be given the opportunity to right the ship is of paramount importance. Breaking the cycle of recidivism before it starts is the right thing to do both fiscally and morally. It's important to note that we are doing all this, while ensuring that our jail and officers are adequately funded all while the overall countywide sales tax is cut in half. This is a positive step forward, and I hope that voters will agree to invest in our public safety programs."

The vote was: Darry Stacy, yes; Rod Cleveland, yes; Harold Haralson, yes. Motion carried.

- C. There was no new business to come before the Board for discussion.
- D. During Commissioners' discussions about County Business, Commissioner Cleveland said that last week, he and Jacob McHughes were at the Eisenhower Executive Office Building to attend the Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska and Oklahoma State Leadership Day. Attendees from Oklahoma consisted of eleven County Commissioners and a Treasurer from Grant County, Muskogee County, Cleveland County, Rogers County, Carter County and Choctaw County. He said that last year, both Commissioner Haralson and Commissioner Stacy attended, but this year things were different by having more people come and speak to them from multiple agencies and departments. They had two main panels this year; the first panel was disaster recovery and the second panel was resilience panel. The panels' discussions focused on the disasters caused by flooding in Iowa, Kansas and Oklahoma which was very interesting. They were provided with a list of contacts from the Office of Intergovernmental Affairs Department. Some of the high points talked about concerned planning. He said they learned from several years ago to have contracts in place for disaster recovery. It was noted and encouraged by Mark Harvey, Special Assistant to the President & Senior Director for Resilience, National Security Council, to have goals of what an area should look like after the recovery; including zoning and planning, etc.

Someone else that Mr. Cleveland found interesting was Mr. John Melle, Assistant U.S. Trade Representative for the Western Hemisphere, Office of the U.S. Trade

Representative, who spoke on the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement and the importance of it.

Deputy Secretary Stephen Censky, U.S. Department of Agriculture and Rural Development, spoke relating to the \$16.0 billion dollar trade deal for the United States farmers.

He concluded by saying they had discussion through the Infrastructure Panel that focused on meeting local infrastructure priorities and building for the future. All the panel speakers joined them in a reception afterwards for an opportunity to network for about an hour and a half. Vice-President Mike Pence met with them at the reception and posed for pictures.

He said that there was a ribbon cutting ceremony at the Lexington-Purcell Bridge last Friday and is happy to say that Cleveland County has a new bridge. The bridge is important for the economy in that area between the two communities. On a personal note, he said that former legislator Bobby Cleveland was very instrumental in getting that declared a statewide economic disaster and it opened up the ability to do some things. He said that Bobby Cleveland worked with the Governor and ODOT to get the funding on the bridge increased over the years to complete the project. Commissioner Stacy referenced the FEMA item discussed concerning hazard mitigation planning. He said that some of his staff met this morning with someone about that very topic and will bring more information forward on projects that they can be funded through the grant process for pre-hazard mitigation. He said that there is money available right now in the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program and will start putting together some projects to receive the funding.

Commissioner Cleveland said that this was discussed and there are multiple federal agencies that have money for mitigation.

Commissioner Stacy said that he was reminded by Brian Wint, Projects Manager, that they closed out their CDBGDR Grant on Friday and thanked everyone for working so hard on that and stated that it was incredible as to what they were able to accomplish on the east side of the county after the 2012 wildfire and the 2013 tornados. He said that it was a long process, but a lot got done and put them ahead. Commissioner Haralson congratulated Mr. Stacy.

Chairman Haralson asked that those representing the Rural Fire Departments to stand and be recognized.

Commissioner Stacy asked them to stay for pictures after the meeting. Chairman Haralson thanked them all for coming to the meeting today. He said, "I attended the ceremonial ribbon cutting at the bridge last Friday morning. It was a great event and had a great time. T.W. Shannon, the Commissioner from Cleveland County was there. We were actually blessed; we have two commissioners, Commissioner at Large Gene McKown and also, T.W. Shannon. I did want to point that out that we do have a little bit of assistance at the Department of Transportation. Thank you to those two for putting us a step forward and doing the job and, hopefully, it will benefit us in Cleveland County as well."

Commissioner Cleveland commended those in attendance that volunteer their time for the Rural Fire Departments.

E. There were no comments made by the Public.

F. There being no further business to come before the Board, Darry Stacy moved, seconded by Rod Cleveland, that the meeting be adjourned at 1:25 P.M. The vote was: Harold Haralson, yes; Darry Stacy, yes; Rod Cleveland, yes. Motion carried.
